

# Jeju Olle Route

## 04 Pyoseon - Namwon Olle



**Total Distance: 23.5km**

**Total Time: 6~7 hour**

**Difficulty: High**

The longest route among the routes of Jeju Olle Trail. There are oreums and seaside walk, but not too rugged. Instead, you need stamina to hike for long along the coastal road. If you are not used to hiking for long, then we recommend you to pace yourself than completing the route in a day.

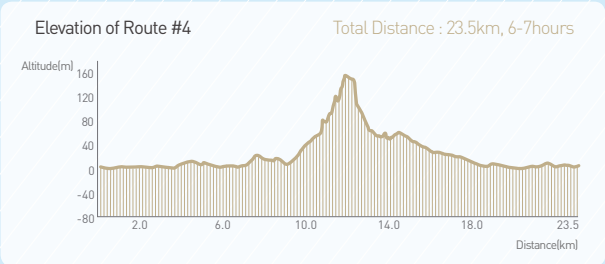


### Restaurants for Lunch

## Route #4 Pyoseon – Namwon Olle

Half of the route is the coastal Olle and the other half is consisted of oreums and Jungsangan Olle. Gama-ri Haenyeo Olle is known as the place showcasing the life of Jeju Hanyeo, the world's fist professional women. Jeju Olle restored the forest trail to Ganeungae in 35 years. Tosan-ri Mang Oreum and Geoseun-saemi(spring) bear extraordinary sceneries of Jungsangan. Geoseun-saemi is a new road, developed by Jeju Olle.

### Transportation

#### Direction to the starting point

**From Jeju-si** Take Bunyoung-ro Bus #720 at the Jeju Intercity Bus Terminal to go to Jeju Folk Village Musum(80 minutes) → Walk for a minute toward Pyoseon Haevichi Beach to find the starting point

**From Seogwipo-si** Take east bound intra-city bus #701 at Seogwipo Intercity Bus Terminal to go to Pyoseon-ri Village Office(40 minutes) → Walk toward Hacheon-ri for 150m → Walk another 15 minutes along the path between Soa Pharmacy and Myeongseong Sesame Oil Shop to find the starting point

#### Direction from the Finishing point

**To Jeju-si** Walk toward Hallasan for 5 minutes → Make a left turn on the crossroad → Take Namjo-ro Bus #730 at Namwon-pogu(port) Bus Stop(60 minutes) → Change to east bound intra-city bus #701 to go to Jeju Intercity Bus Terminal(120 minutes)

**To Seogwipo-si** Walk toward Hallasan for 5 minutes → Walk another 2 minutes to the bus stop in front of Samsung Fire & Marine Insurance across the road at the crossroad → Take Namjo-ro Bus #730 at Namwon-pogu(port) Bus Stop(40 minutes) → Change to east bound intra-city bus #701 to go to Seogwipo Intercity Bus Terminal(40 minutes)

### Attractions

**Pyoseon Danke-pogu(port)** According to the myth, surroundings of Danke-pogu(port) were devastated whenever it was hit by typhoon. People got together to wish well-being of the village to Seolmundae Halmang, the creator goddess of Jeju, and she built the port for them. There is a shrine dedicated to Seolmundae Halmang near the port at the end of the beach.

**Ganeungae** The name comes from its look – the narrow point of the ocean at joining a stream. There is a forest of scrubs these days.

**Mang Oreum** There was a bongsoodaе(signal-fire tower) in Chosun dynasty, communicating with Jabe-bongsoo of the West and Dalsan-bongsoo of the East. You can still find the trace of bongsoodaе(signal-fire tower) at the peak.

**Geoseun-saemi** Most springs flow from top to bottom, from the mountain to the ocean. Geoseun-saemi is different. It flows upward from the ocean to Halla-san. There is a myth. Encountering news on a promising talent born in Jeju, a royal family in China dispatched General Hojongdan to cut off the energy from the mountain and the water. Luckily, Geoseun-saemi and Nodansaemi were not affected then and are still flowing upward to these days.
